Air and Rail Transportation

Metrorail: Washington's Metro is a clean, convenient subway system. Feminist Bioethics

In this session, we will look at a variety of ways in which attention to issues of gender can provide insight in bioethics. Issues include both applied questions about the treatment of women in medicine, from the beginning to end of life, as well as, ways in which feminist theory, more generally, might inform the theory we use in all of bioethics. We will include topics in health care ethics, issues surrounding gestation, autonomy and the ethics of care.

Bioethics Movie Night

Bioethics Movie Night presents an opportunity for participants to view selected clips from our diverse collection of bioethics videos. Video selections are chosen to highlight resources appropriate to enrich course syllabi, to promote group discussion and/or to inform ethics committees. A detailed schedule will be distributed at the IBC along with handouts which will focus on resources useful for identifying and acquiring bioethics-related videos.

Clinical Research Ethics

This session will help participants to understand the basis for current ethical analysis of research involving humans. Its focus will be on the questions of how and why ethical analysis of research involving humans has differed from the ethical analysis of other human activities which involve exposing some to risks for the benefit of others. Participants will discuss the extent to which these proposed differences explain the variations in ethical analysis.

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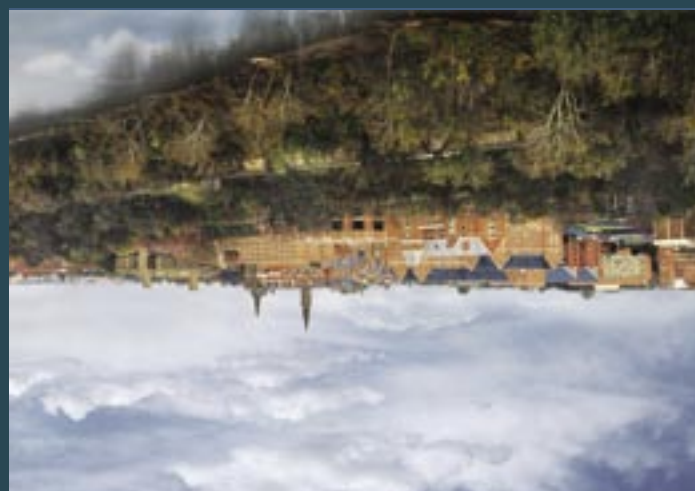

The Joseph P. and Rose F. Kennedy Institute of Ethics

is one of the world's premier institutes for research in bioethics. Situated on the historic campus of Georgetown University, the Institute brings together leading scholars and the finest library dedicated to the field.

The course is designed to address the most challenging topics in health care ethics. It provides the opportunity for participants from different disciplines to come together to explore the theoretical framework and practical issues of bioethics with a distinguished faculty. Lectures and panel discussions are paired with small group discussions, allowing in-depth exploration of issues and personal interactions. The course is truly intensive, with much of the intellectual interchange taking place over shared meals and in extra additional education opportunity discussions.

Specific aims for the course are to introduce participants to the philosophical underpinnings of bioethics and current major topics in the field, and to provide them with skills to define and describe various principles of and approaches to bioethics in medical

practice, law and public policy. Participants will understand and be able to demonstrate bioethical principles within a solid framework of decisionmaking in clinical, research, and policy settings.

While on campus, course participants enjoy full access to the National Reference Center for Bioethics Literature, the world's largest collection of bioethics resources. A committed staff of librarians is available to assist course participants with bibliographical searches for their research. They also offer a series of invaluable training sessions for those interested in learning how to access bioethics databases and the burgeoning resources available on the Internet and World Wide Web.

Your attendance will begin an ongoing relationship with the Institute and its resources. Course participants receive a one-year membership to the Kennedy Institute Member's Program; membership benefits include a subscription to the Kennedy Institute of Ethics Journal, and invitations to various events throughout the year open to members.

Library Proseminar

Jump-start your research and reading and make the most of your time at the IBC!

The National Reference Center for Bioethics Literature (NRCBL) is home to an unparalleled collection of bioethics literature. The reference staff of this library, the world's oldest and largest of its kind, offer IBC participants a pre-conference seminar on bioethics resources and reference services to enhance their research, writing, teaching, and clinical practice. The proseminar program will introduce attendees to the collection, train them in the use of associated online bioethics databases, and highlight resources available to them onsite and online.

The library's holdings include – in addition to more than 250,000 books and articles – archival materials from federal bioethics commissions, videos and documentaries, course syllabi, and several special collections, such as the Kampelman Collection of Jewish Ethics and the Rose F. Kennedy Collection on Women, Infants, and Children. Almost 500 journal and newsletter titles are available.

The computer-based Proseminar format will

- permit library staff to demonstrate search strategies and tips for several free, web databases containing bioethics information (e.g., PubMed, NLM Catalog, ETHX on the Web, and Genetics and Ethics);

- offer participants hands-on reinforcement of training in techniques to retrieve bioethics information from these databases, including crafting a precise search strategy using the library's unique numeric classification scheme; and

- provide attendees with the opportunity to try search approaches online.

An individual consultation that you may schedule with a reference librarian during the course of the week allows each proseminar participant to obtain additional individualized help in identifying resources and developing search strategies for primary research interests. Each registrant will receive an extensive Searcher's Manual prepared by the staff: Bioethics Searcher's Guides: Using National Library of Medicine and National Reference Center for Bioethics Literature Databases.

Two core symposia are offered: Monday, June 4, 2007 from 9 to 11 am OR from 1-3 pm. Consultations with librarians may be scheduled throughout the week. The Library Proseminar requires pre-registration and an additional fee of \$125.00. Space is limited! Sign up for the session of your choice on the Registration Form.

Tom Beauchamp, Ph.D., is Professor of Philosophy at Georgetown University. In 1976, he joined the staff of the National Commission for the Protection of Human Subjects of Biomedical and Behavioral Research, where he wrote the bulk of the Belmont Report. He is a noted scholar of the 18th c. Scottish philosopher, David Hume. With James F. Childress, Ph.D., Tom authored the seminal work (and the IBC course book), *Principles of Biomedical Ethics*, now in its 5th edition. His research interests are in the history of modern philosophy and practical ethics, in particular biomedical and business ethics.

James F. Childress, Ph.D., is the Hollingsworth Professor of Ethics and Professor of Medical Education at the University of Virginia, where he directs the Institute for Practical Ethics. In 1990 he was named Professor of the Year in the state of Virginia by the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education. He is the author of numerous articles and several books, including *Principles of Biomedical Ethics* with Tom Beauchamp, *Practical Reasoning in Bioethics, Who Should Decide? Paternalism in Health Care and Priorities in Biomedical Ethics*. He was a member of the presidentially-appointed National Bioethics Advisory Commission.

John Keown, D. Phil., Ph.D., holds the Rose F. Kennedy Chair in Christian Ethics at the Kennedy Institute of Ethics. With a degree in law from the University of Cambridge, he received his doctorate from the University of Oxford. His research has been cited widely, in particular by the U.S. Supreme Court (in its decision on physician-assisted suicide), by the English Court of Appeal in the conjoined twins case of 2000; and by the House of Lords Select Committee on Medical Ethics. He recently authored *Considering Physician Assisted Suicide* (2006).

Maggie O. Little, Ph.D., the IBC Course Director, is a philosopher with graduate degrees from the University of Oxford and UC-Berkeley. A member of the Institute since 1994, she has published on a broad range of topics in ethics, from moral epistemology and moral realism to applied issues in bioethics. She has written on surrogate motherhood, abortion, method in moral theory, and the objectivity of ethics. Her publications include *Abortion, Intimacy and the "Duty" to Gestate*, and she is co-editor of a book with Brad Hooker, *Moral Particularism*.

Edmund Pellegrino, M.D., is Professor Emeritus of Medicine and Medical Ethics at the Center for Clinical Bioethics at Georgetown University Medical Center. In fall 2005, Dr. Pellegrino was appointed as the Chair of the President's Council on Bioethics. Dr. Pellegrino has authored over 550 published items in medical science, philosophy, and ethics and is a member of numerous editorial boards. He is the author or co-author of 19 books, and the founding editor of the *Journal of Medicine and Philosophy*. Dr. Pellegrino has

Gopal Sreenivasan, Ph.D., has interests in the research and analysis of the various social determinants of health and their relation to justice. As Canada Research Chair in Justice and Health Care at the University of Toronto, Dr. Sreenivasan is using principles of moral philosophy to help improve health and health care within Canada and around the world.

Robert M. Veatch, Ph.D., is Professor of Medical Ethics at Georgetown University. He writes extensively on medical ethics, including pharmacy and nursing ethics. He is the Senior Editor of the *Kennedy Institute of Ethics Journal* and the *Newsletter on Ethics and Intellectual Disability*. He frequently serves as an expert witness in cases of medical ethics, and may be best known as the ethics consultant in the case of Baby K. He has worked extensively in areas of death and dying, human experimentation, and organ transplantation. Among many other books, he is the author of *Transplantation Ethics* and *The Basics of Bioethics*.

LeRoy Walters, Ph.D., is the Joseph P. Kennedy Professor of Christian Ethics at the Kennedy Institute of Ethics. He is a former director of the Institute, with special interests in ethical issues in eugenics, human genetics, and international stem cell research policies. He teaches courses on "Ethics and Human Genetics", "Eugenics and Ethics," and "Ethics and the Holocaust." His most recent books include co-authoring with Tom Beauchamp, *Contemporary Issues in Bioethics*, and *The Ethics of Human Gene Therapy* with Julie Gage Palmer.

Robin L. West, J.D., has written extensively on gender issues and feminist legal theory, jurisprudence and legal philosophy, and law and literature. Professor West came to the Georgetown University Law Center from the University of Maryland Law School, where she was professor of law and taught Constitutional Law, Contracts, Legal Methods, Jurisprudence, Law and Literature, and a Maryland Legal Theory Workshop. She has been a visiting professor at the University of Chicago and Stanford Law Schools, the Cleveland-Marshall College of Law at Cleveland State University, and, most recently, at the Law Center.
